It was a pro-active meeting with a range of interesting displays: past copies of Distinctly Winkleigh, a full display of the **Hedge Survey** on A3 cards, **Footpath Map** and **James Ravilious** photos of Winkleigh Fair. We asked those present to mark their preferences for purchase of a few of the pictures (see below).



Internationally renowned artist **Andrew Sinclair** assisted by **Diane Coates** gave an illustrated presentation of his work at the **Sculpture School**. His latest commission a memorial to **The Duke of Wellington's Regiment** is to be unveiled at Halifax next month. The sculpture is 12 ft. tall and weighs 1.5 tonnes. The audience was thoroughly absorbed by the range and complexity of his work.

**Katrina Brookes** from **Young Farmers Club** told us about their wide range of activities. **Kim Melhuish** also spoke about the work of the **Green Group**.

County Councillor **Andrew Saywell** took over as Chair while the committee was re-elected, with the addition of **Sue Dally** from Hollocombe.

**Beaford Archive Presentation and Exhibition** was our flagship event. The outcome was that we will buy, frame & hang four Ravilious photographs in the Community Centre.

**Visit to North Devon Heritage Centre (Barnstaple)** where we saw archive documents (both Parish & Church) relating to Winkleigh, some dating back to the 1600's. **OUTCOME: We have pledged £50 for each of the next 3 years to support this invaluable archive. As a result we have been invited to attend their Open Day event in June. Interested?** Please contact a WS committee member.

**Airfield Memorial Service.** Winkleigh Society helped organize this event in November. The Service attracted 85 people, despite the atrocious weather. We made a concerted effort to invite all the new businesses on the Airfield, aware that many changes are happening there. **Future Project: We hope to erect a permanent flagpole at the Airfield Memorial site and have contacted Torrridge District Council for guidance.**

**Hedge Survey for the Neighbourhood Plan:** conducted by **Sue Dally** and **Kim Melhuish**, assisted Devon Wildlife Trust, on behalf of WPC & NP Group. **Winkleigh War Memorial Custodianship**  
**Churchyard of the Church of All Saints, Winkleigh, Devon**  
**Awarded Listed Building Status - List Entry Number: 1462755**



Winkleigh Parish Councillors are keen to become custodians of the Winkleigh War Memorial in the Churchyard if the current owner/custodian cannot be located, to ensure that the Memorial is cared for and maintained for the benefit of the Parish.

We have determined that the memorial was raised within the churchyard of the Church of All Saints in Winkleigh as a permanent testament to the sacrifice made by 24 members of the local community who lost their lives in the First World War. The memorial was designed and made by Herbert Read of St Sidwell's Art Works, Exeter, and the costs were met by public subscription, with a total of £215 having been collected by May 1920. Winkleigh War Memorial was unveiled on 13 January 1921 by Colonel Alexander, a member of the War Memorial

Committee, and dedicated by Reverend Edmonds. The names of six local men who died during the Second World War were added later.

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War memorials were primarily erected by local communities and therefore custodianship of war memorials varies as they were generally erected through public subscription by communities and the issue of 'ownership' was inappropriate. As such a local war memorial may have no one looking after it, or those responsible for it may have limited funds which means they cannot adequately cover either maintenance or repairs.

As the majority of war memorials were created by public subscription through committees formed for their commissioning (and usually dissolved after completion), the ownership can only be established if a formal transfer of responsibility occurred after the war memorial's dedication/creation.

If a formal transfer of ownership at any point in the war memorial's history cannot be established, then the War Memorials (Local Authorities' Powers) Act of 1923 and subsequent amendments enables local councils to carry out work to war memorials within their area whether they officially 'own' them or not.

## Tribute to Richard Holberry

We met Richard shortly after we came to live in Winkleigh nearly 22 years ago and we bonded immediately, for we shared many interests with him.

He loved and had a great knowledge of classical music, especially opera. He was very good at spotting an up-and-coming musician and would forecast that the person would be well known in a year or so. He was always right. He loved the theatre and enjoyed drama and musicals. He would visit his friends in London several times a year and would always see a show or play in the West End. He also loved art and we would go up to London at least once a year to an exhibition, his favourite place being the Queen's Gallery at Buckingham Palace.

He had a great interest in books: paintings, novels, and biographies. When Emma Nicholson lived in the village she asked him to catalogue their library. He was in his element. He also enjoyed dancing and when he went to a wedding or anniversary, he would, apparently, be on the floor for a large part of the evening.

He was very good company and we never had a party without him. He was a great supporter of **Young Musicians Support**, which raises funds to help talented young people in this part of Devon, who could not afford music lessons and/or instruments. He didn't want them to be held back because of lack of funds and wanted to see them pursue their love of music. It was because of this interest that his much loved adopted family, the Underhills at Beaford, chose the charity for the collection at his funeral.

Richard was unique, very eccentric, exasperating at times, lovable, a good friend, interested in everything, kind, always helpful, very amusing, and we miss him so much.

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## Winkleigh Parish Council - Chair's Annual Report -2018/19

### **Finance:**

Successful grant applications for the 2018/19 financial year were paid in April 2018 as follows:

C.A.B - £250 towards volunteer advisers including training.

O.D.C.T.G - £400 towards continuation of their current services including the Ring and Ride bus service, voluntary car service and wheelchair accessible transport.

Other donations made during 2018/19 were: £75 to the Royal British Legion for a wreath to commemorate Remembrance Day.

The Parish Council were within budget last year and the increase in precept this year is to fund the Village Hall and Sports Centre grant applications for the benefit of the community otherwise we would have had a minimal increase in the budget simply to cover annual cost increases.

### **Neighbourhood Development Plan:**

The group have been working hard behind the scenes to develop the draft Neighbourhood Plan for Winkleigh; there will be a public consultation period which will be advertised on the Parish Council Website and on our Facebook page. Thanks to all those who are part of the group for their work on behalf of the Parish.

The Neighbourhood development plan should, hopefully, be going to TDC for final consultation and then a referendum later in 2019; if at least 51% of those who vote say 'yes' Winkleigh will be able to formally adopt the plan, which will then be a statutory planning document.

### **Council Vacancies:**

There are vacancies on the Parish Council which we will hopefully be able to fill by Co-option. Being a Councillor is not just about attending meetings, there is plenty that goes on behind the scenes, for example, asset inspections including the cemetery and Bungalow, various training courses and conferences on a wide range of topics, the work and tidy group are often out and about helping to keep footpaths tidy and help improve the appearance of the village. **Projects that have been undertaken this year:**

This year has seen the completion of the new bus shelter on Exeter Road; thank you to all those who played a part in this, from supply of materials to those tasked with demolition of the old structure and the building of the new shelter.

Many of you may have seen the display which was up in the 3 Halls noticeboard on the side of the shop back in November to commemorate 100 years since WWI; this is a display which the Council hope to be able to put up each year.

**Looking forward to 2019-20:**

The Council is looking forward to an increase in powers which we will have access to once the Clerk has completed her CiLCA qualification; the additional staff costs this year have been as a result of the time that she has spent on completing the various modules in the course and creating the new policies needed to ensure that the council is meeting its legal obligations.

This year the Council is hoping to achieve the installation of new gateway signage for the Parish in order to celebrate our history and maybe encourage drivers to slow down.

The Parish Council is looking at adopting the Winkleigh War Memorial, this will enable us to ensure that it is kept in good condition for generations to come.

**Finally:**

Thanks are due to TDC/DCC for the Community Together Funds/TAP fund which has run in recent years, the Parish Council have been lucky to receive contributions towards the costs of the defibrillator (twice), replacement of the Village Hall fire-door as well as the footpath booklet, which give details of several walks in and around the Parish.

I would like to extend my thanks to Betty Boundy for her service as our district Cllr, to District Cllr David Hurley who has filled in for Betty when her health would not permit her to represent the ward and to County Cllr Andrew Saywell for all his hard work.

I would also like to thank all those who have served as Cllrs during this last year for the time and effort that they put into council business.

Thank you to all the parishioners who attend meetings, are our eyes and ears providing feedback on local matters, as well as those who help support activities and groups within the Parish in whatever way they can.

Special votes of thanks must go to our Clerk, Melanie Bickell for all the hard work that she puts in behind the scenes to allow the council to function effectively and for us as Cllrs to be able to do our jobs and last but not least to Cllr Sue Ware who is stepping down at the end of this term of office for her help and support as Vice Chair this last year.

## Restore to its Former Glory

The editor's email giving the deadline date for DW arrives as the flames roar out of the great nave of Notre Dame de Paris and immediate promises are made to restore it 'to its former glory'. Having spent much of my life with heritage questions like this, I have heard this phrase many times before. It is never simple, and even at Notre Dame, where the state of the stonework appears to allow restoration, there were soon phrases such as 'even more beautiful' and a competition proposed for a redesigned spire.

Before moving to Winkleigh I was involved with Poltimore House, a ruined country mansion east of Exeter. The original house was Tudor with large additions in the 17<sup>th</sup> century (including the plastered Saloon described as the finest room in the South West by Pevsner), further growth in Victorian days, a large ball-room in 1904. After occupation by two schools it became a hospital in the 1950's. Which 'former glory' should we take as the real one? We thought we should demolish the 1904 ball-room which was virtually demolished already, and restore the original rooms to their Tudor origin. On taking a group around the house by torchlight, I asked if anyone could guess the purpose of this room. A voice piped up, 'Yes, this is the operating theatre, and must surely be the only one left in the country with intact terrazzo walls and floor.' He was a medical historian, so another date was added to the 'former glory'.

Civil War enthusiasts would come to re-enact the signing of the Peace treaty in the Saloon, but the wonderful plasterwork post-dated that historic event. Do we strip out the plaster-work? Thieves had already mostly removed the decorations, but some had been rescued by an eagle-eyed Irish Garda who stopped one container load going off to architectural salvage firms in the US. The trees just outside were originally planted by James Veitch in the 1820's and were the first Chile Pines in England, every seedling of which was now rare. Do we cut them down for 'authenticity'? Oh yes, and what about the five species of bat in the attics?

Is there sufficient old fabric remaining to make this a repair job or is it restoration, renovation, or rebuilding? Do you restore using authentic materials? Is that quarry still open? Can you get oak beams of that length? If there is sculpture do you make a new one, or do you make one as weathered as the current one? Pristine mediaeval sculpture on a mediaeval church can look distinctly odd. Do you only use authentic 16<sup>th</sup> century tools, or do you allow power saws? Is there anybody with the skills to make those particular timber joints?

The local tourist organisation may take the view that this doesn't matter as long as it looks old, not the genuine patina of age. The roof would be better and less fire risk in modern materials perhaps. Architects usually demand 'authenticity' and for many other people too it needs to be 'the real thing' not a plastic copy. We certainly were interested in replacing that ball room with a modern art gallery, but not a pastiche of the old.

There are options other than 'restoration'. One is simply to leave the building as a ruin; many important buildings are in ruins, notably mediaeval abbeys such as Fountains, castles, or places kept as memorials as Charles Church in Plymouth. In New York the twin towers have not been rebuilt. In Poltimore village, the locals were by no means united in wanting a restoration. They would lose their free park in which to walk their dogs. In any case there was not a lot of love for the family that had ruled their lives for centuries. One other group who welcomed the idea of a ruin was the film-makers. There are plenty of superb old mansions, often in the care of the National Trust, for costume dramas. But when they need a ruin to 'stand in for' the Reichstag at the end of World War 2 then Poltimore was very useful. I still treasure the photos of Russian tanks outside the windows.

These are all questions for a building with no current function, owner or users. There are so many stakeholders, apart from the locals and the film makers. Tourists seem always to be interested in the family of the house, not the architecture. People are interested in people. Some of those visitors have special connections, making them 'insiders', and at Poltimore we had many who had been treated at the hospital or born there. Others had been at the boys' school during the War or the girls' school in the 1930s. Some of them were very elderly, quite wealthy, and sensible. Trustees would bear in mind their ability to leave legacies, so their views were interesting. Our 'friends of Poltimore' were aghast at the idea that it might be carefully restored, but private and closed. For them it was a hobby.

The restorers of Notre Dame have my sympathy, adding all the issues of the congregation and the church let alone the cultural significance in such a building. In one English cathedral the roof bosses were being restored when the expert pointed out that there should be seven shades of blue in the angels' eyes. She was told that no-one could possibly see that from floor-level, but she pointed out that God could see. Yet another stakeholder. And I do hope they do not forget that the purpose of a church building is to act as a sound box for the organist..... yet another.

## D & S Supplies - The End of an Era

D & S was started back in 1988 operating from a small unit at the rear of Surf Bay Leisure by Steve, Shirley and her brother Derek and his wife Elaine. I still worked full time at Vital Pet Products but worked every weekend at D & S and Shirley worked 25 hours at the local school, so we employed sister Alison to fill-in the additional hours.

When our site was sold we had to look for new premises and luckily a new unit was being built at the other end of the airfield by Ron Cottey and Michael Thorne to divide into units. With little choice we took the plunge to lease the unit to run as a husband and wife venture, with the aim of creating an in-store cafe which led to the decision to employ more staff.

We had at that time 3 daughters Tracey, Kay and Gemma; it was hard work with the commitment and juggling our family life, so I gave up the job at Vital and worked at the business full time. With the new move we also employed Sue to run the cafe. Around this time our eldest daughter Tracey had a serious car accident so Shirley had to give up her school job to be a carer for our daughter, as well as running the shop.

Then in 1998, on a break clause in our lease, we decided to purchase the freehold and extend the building thus making it possible to employ Alison, Lydia, and Ryan along with many local students who worked weekends and school holidays.



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Following untold security problems with people trying to get into our building before opening hours and being ram-raided which was the last straw, we applied for permission for a bungalow to live on-site, which finally stopped the problems.

We both averaged 70-hours a week keeping the business running 7 days a week for a total of just over 28 wonderful years, when we felt the need to slow down.

We did not want to just walk away, yet the location proved difficult for selling the property, along with the long hours, so we decided to lease it instead.

We were so pleased it was going to be taken on by local people offering the same services, yet two and a half years later the doors have closed: a sad day for both of us and the village as a whole.

Over the years we had built up great friendships with our customers and their families throughout the area and have seen many changes in the retail business along with the loss of local banks and services. I think we all agree it is a fast changing world and not always for the better, but we must embrace change. Without the support of so many customers and staff we would never have been able to go on for so long. We miss you all but will keep up contact and continue to enjoy village life, as well as supporting the Airfield Memorial Day, as we hold a lot of airfield memorabilia.

As for D & S we will try to find new owners but if that is not possible, divide it into smaller units with the aim of encouraging more businesses into the parish.

Now something different this quarter: we all know that potholes are a problem and Devon Highways want people to report them. It is simple to do. If you have access to a smartphone or computer just Google **REPORT a POTHOLE**, find the Devon website and follow the instructions. Hopefully if enough of us report the potholes DCC Highways will get fed up with having to keep returning to the village and cover all the potholes in one go, or maybe even resurface the roads.



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Next, everyone should be aware that DCC are not clearing growing weeds etc. from gutters. The growth in some gutters prevents rain water from entering drains and causes large puddles; these can then cover potholes and will prevent drivers seeing and avoiding them. Wouldn't it be nice if we all cleared the gutter outside our property and disposed of the weeds in our green bins? - Just a thought.

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## Our Devon County Councillor Writes ....



First, I would like to congratulate Simon Newton on his election as Winkleigh's new District Councillor. I am sure he will do a great job representing Winkleigh on Torridge District Council and I am looking forward to working with him on the many issues where there is a crossover between the District and County Councils. My commiserations also to the unsuccessful candidates.

One of the main issues I have been following closely in the village is the proposed development in the field next to the Cemetery. Devon County Council are not the planning authority for this development, however County Highways will be consulted on any application that is submitted.

I know that many residents were concerned by the initial plans that were presented, and the proposed access location to the development. However, at the recent Annual Parish Meeting the Developer indicated a willingness to change the access, so we will have to wait and see what new proposals they come up with.

On a different subject, and one I know that is often on residents' minds – highways – readers may be interested to know that the Torrington Rural division has been selected to trial different ways of working when designing schemes and allocating which roads should be repaired. I know at times it can sometimes seem mystifying why a certain road is selected for repairs while a nearby one in a worse condition is not. It is early days and once I have more details I will inform readers, but the idea behind the pilot is to have closer cooperation and working together with Parishes and Communities to identify the roads that need the most attention. I look forward to seeing how this pilot develops. At the very least, I am really pleased that this important pilot has been chosen to take place in our part of the County, rather than South or East Devon!

There are several schemes in the system for Winkleigh and I know many residents would like to see improvements to the roads here. I will certainly be using the opportunity of this pilot to further press the case for getting the roads within the village itself repaired. There are plans to patch Torrington Road this year and I hope I can get more work done within the village as well.

However, while it can sometimes seem that all the County Council is responsible for is its roads, I can assure readers that the County Council does a huge amount of work, sometimes not always seen, to look after the old, the young and the vulnerable.

Devon is a big county, with around 800,000 residents. There are over 105,000 young people in the 360+ Devon Schools, and over 22,000 of these young people have some sort of School Transport. Nearly 9,000 of these young people are being supported in some way by DCC staff and this must and will continue.

The Council's Adult Services Department is currently looking after 19,000 adults and over the last 12 months over 24,000 clients have received either an Assessment or a service within the Adult Care Service. Again, DCC will continue to support these people.



# Devon Wildlife Trust

## Culm Grassland Natural Flood Management Project



This four year project across North Devon is helping us to understand, communicate and increase the benefits for flood risk and wildlife that Culm grasslands bring to North Devon's communities.

A large proportion of the UK's nationally important Culm grasslands are found in the Torridge, Taw, Tamar and Exe river catchments. Despite significant conservation efforts, Culm grassland is still under threat, and the habitat is fragmented across a landscape where farming continues to intensify. However, understanding is increasing about the benefits of Culm grassland to society, for wildlife, water management, carbon storage and more.

### ***About the project***

The Culm Grassland Natural Flood Management Project is led by Devon Wildlife Trust (DWT), supported and funded by the Environment Agency (EA), Devon County Council (DCC) and the European Union through the Interreg 2 Seas Triple C Project. Delivery is supported by a partnership of EA, DCC, University of Exeter and Natural England. The project started in October 2016 and runs to September 2020.

### ***Project aims***

1. Learn more about how Culm grassland can help to hold and release water in catchments
2. Increase everyone's understanding about the value of Culm grassland
3. Work with landowners to protect, restore and re-create Culm grassland sites across North Devon
4. Share our learning with others across the South West, UK and Europe

### ***Project progress***

Since the start of the project our advisors have made over 550 farm visits, offering advice to landowners of 150 separate holdings. DWT can provide the following services for owners of Culm grassland:

- Habitat management advice;
- Assistance with Countryside Stewardship applications (both Mid-Tier and Higher Tier);
- Soft rush topping / weed wiping on Culm grassland;
- Assistance with swaling purple moor-grass dominated Culm grassland;
- We have a small capital grant budget to assist with fencing, installing troughs or clearing scrub;
- Our volunteer group can assist with scrub clearance and species surveys.

To date the project team has helped bring over 300 ha of Culm grassland under positive management and created 57 ha of new species-rich grassland. Overall the project has had a direct positive influence on around 30 km of river. We have held eight training events to raise awareness and understanding of various aspects of Culm grassland management and wildlife value.

Our PhD student, Nicola, has also been busy. Over the summer she installed 55 dipwells across 11 fields to monitor water storage potential of different grassland types. Recently she has been using a rainfall simulator to increase understanding of how Culm grassland reacts to heavy rainfall events (something we're familiar with here in Devon!), and how this response differs in intensively managed pastures.

## **Fiona's Farm Fayre** **- A Real Family Farming Endeavour**

What a versatile and Community-serving business this is! Located just on the outskirts of the village at Higher Punchardon, Winkleigh EX19 8DJ on the road leading towards Bridge Reeve, is Fiona's Farm Fayre which is both a fine place to sit and enjoy home-made, home-grown fresh food and also a shop to buy fresh food, mostly from the farm itself or local seasonal produce.

The whole idea started over 18 years ago because Fiona likes to cook. It all began with an honesty box, and the farm became known as a place where you could buy vegetables that had been growing that morning and a sumptuous selection of home-made cakes, pies and pasties.

Fourteen years ago, it became apparent that this family farm concern needed a bigger outlet, and the Farm Fayre Shop and Cafe Restaurant building was erected along with parking facilities made available for both shoppers and diners. Three years ago the kitchen area was extended to cater for the ever growing demand. The whole family runs the farm, the shop and the cafe restaurant all together.

Fiona is justifiably proud of the whole endeavour and its ethos of providing home reared produce. "Increasingly, and quite rightly, people like to know where their food comes from, how their meat is produced, the conditions in which animals for meat are kept and treated; we have maximum traceability" she explains. "We are a Christian family with principles and values borne from our faith. We simply provide food for other people that is produced and prepared with the high standards and integrity which we enjoy ourselves."

Indeed, the farm itself is reminiscent of the traditional farms we used to know, with cattle, sheep and pigs, sheep dogs, even sometimes Barn owls (NOT on the menu!!) within sight of the windows. Native British cattle, mainly Hereford/Devon X and Aberdeen Angus and about 60 sheep graze the farm's own land, rented ground and Devon Wildlife Trust land. This farm food outlet is producing the highest quality traditional food in the way that countless farms used to before the days of mass production and supermarkets, and of course, as many customers have told me time and time again, **YOU CAN TASTE THE DIFFERENCE!**



On the first Saturday of each month Fiona's is also open for dining in the evening. Booking beforehand is essential as, when we visited in April for the purposes of this report, every table

was full. The clientele was unanimous in their praise for the food which was borne out by the fact that every plate had been cleared completely. Customers come to Fiona's from local and surrounding areas to enjoy the calm evening ambience, pleasant company and good food. A couple of guys told me they love the evening menu, but that they also are weekly regulars for breakfast, which they wanted to thoroughly recommend, "You can't beat a full Farm breakfast here" I was told.



Indeed, daytimes, quite apart from breakfast and luncheon, you can't beat Fiona's proper home-made Devon cream tea either, or the sumptuous chocolate Easter cake that was sitting so enticingly on the counter. The shop and dining area is light and airy, spotlessly clean and inviting. Local neighbours popped in for a quick chat and a huge cauliflower, someone else arrived to collect a pre-ordered fresh seasonal Vegetable box, and a family member reported in on some farm issues and mentioned the cows (Tim knows them all by name, each year they

have a theme for the naming of cattle). Customers can order meat fresh, but generally the meat is fast frozen.

Fiona's produce is also available on their stall at the Winkleigh Market on the first Saturday morning of the month in the Village Hall and weekly at the Wednesday morning mini-market and coffee morning in the Community Centre. This is a great opportunity to buy local freshly baked breads and rolls and Fiona's cakes and savouries as well as fresh veggies in season. Fiona also runs the weekly Oasis Cafe, held in the Methodist Chapel from 11 am until 2 pm (lunches from 12.30 pm) for which she provides and cooks the food. This is open to all and is a set menu providing a lovely cooked meal in a warm and pleasant atmosphere. We attended the last Monday Oasis on 29<sup>th</sup> April, but from May, please note the day has now changed to



Wednesdays.

There's a group of friends who eat and dine there regularly, but when we visited, there were also some who had not been before, and again the consensus was that the food is first class and the testament was every plate was completely cleared. The meal of the day is £5.50, with dessert



£7.50, and with tea or coffee £8.50. (Prices correct at time of going to press). The Rota for volunteers to help to run this weekly lunch for the community, is mainly but not necessarily, members of the Methodist Chapel and I have been asked to mention that if anyone would like to volunteer to help, even perhaps on a relief basis, they would be most welcome. These volunteers serve and

wash up, also deliver meals to those in the village who are unable to get to the cafe. On the day we visited, there were 4 delivery meals.

Fiona's Farm Fayre is open Monday to Friday 10 am until 5 pm and Saturdays 10 am until 2 pm. Please ring to book for Seasonal Veg boxes, Saturday Monthly Dining Evenings, large parties, special dietary requirements, events catering or private buffets.

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## Youth and the Neighbourhood Plan

The Neighbourhood Plan Group recently sought the opinions and attitudes of the younger members of our community towards a range of issues that impact their daily life both in, and around, the village of Winkleigh.

They did this through a multi-page questionnaire distributed to students at the **Winkleigh Primary School and the Chulmleigh Academy**. Completion of the questionnaire was voluntary. A total of 90 young people, aged between 9 and 17 years, took the time to consider and reply to the survey. An encouraging response rate that represents around half (50%) of the youth demographic of the Parish. By so doing, our younger community members have provided valuable insight into their 'likes' and 'dislikes.' How Winkleigh is viewed by many of its youngest residents.

I was asked by the members of the Group to assist with the compilation and presentation of the questionnaire results and to attempt to provide some statistical analysis and interpretation. This I have recently done. The Neighbourhood Plan Group will no doubt be considering and releasing the full findings at some point in the Neighbourhood Plan process. However, at this stage. I have been asked to provide residents with some general comment and reaction.

There are two clear themes that emerge from the results of the survey:

1. Younger members of the community very much share similar concerns and attitudes as do their parents and other residents towards many local issues and challenges – traffic, speeding, parking, safety, movement, access to retail, recreational and social services, were all subjects frequently mentioned in comments and observations.
2. Local availability and access to (and the lack of) recreational and leisure activities that focus exclusively, or primarily, on the young, heavily influenced younger people's attitudes and views towards daily life in and around the community.

These are but broad interpretations. As is often remarked, 'the young are our future.' The young people of Winkleigh have clear views on their community. They want to see it thrive. As the intent of the questionnaire was to obtain a perspective on their thoughts and attitudes, thereby helping guide and inform the content of the upcoming Neighbourhood Plan, I am sure the feedback will be well-reviewed and considered.

We also have a **15-seat community minibus**, available for group trips, which we use for weekend and weekday trips to various locations, with suggestions welcome.

## Britannia Sailing Trust Airfield Garage, Seckington Cross

Since our last contribution to Distinctly Winkleigh work has continued on Britannia, and much progress has been made, thanks to all our loyal volunteers.

We have now removed nearly all the interior fittings allowing access to the hull and frames. Two very large planks of wood that are called the bilge stringers, which run fore and aft half way between the keel and the deck, have now been refastened – a job that has not been done since she was built in 1915, so it was very important to be able to complete that task. Some of the nails that came out were very tired! (*Pictures 1 and 2*).

We completed a complicated process of taking the lines off her – a procedure that will enable calculations to be done for weight and balance, helping to ensure that she is ballasted correctly and is stable when sailing. This process took about 6 weeks to complete as precise and frequent measurements needed to be taken. The next stage is to use these measurements to draw up plans showing longitudinal and cross sections of the hull. When Britannia was built in 1915 there were no plans – the traditional boat builders of the time used to make a wooden half model and then loft out the ship from that – amazing expertise and skill.

The latest task has been to remove all the covering board which is the section of timber that connects the deck to the hull, with the stanchions (technical name for the top section of the frames that extend above the deck), at deck level. This is complicated and back to front in boatbuilding terms, but it has to be done as the edge of the new



deck was laid incorrectly, which meant that it leaked, causing further issues with timbers underneath. In order to address this we have recut the deck where it meets the covering board, and patterns have now been made for a new margin, or spirkitting, to accommodate the new deck edge. Any shipwrights or boat builders reading this will know that this is back to front construction, but we have to do it this way to save laying a whole new deck, which would be costly in time and money, but also wasteful as the rest of the deck is good and made of good quality timber. Pictures 3 and 4 (Left) show this process and the patterns.

Enough of technicalities!



We were delighted to host a visit in March from the **Iddesleigh Farmers Group**. About 25 people came to see around the boat and listen to Sam's stories about her and why we are doing it. We are very happy to do this again for anyone, individuals or groups, if they are interested in our project. **Britannia is a unique piece of Britain's Maritime Heritage and deserves to be saved in her own right, and to go back to sea.** This restoration should ensure that, with regular and correct maintenance, she will last for another hundred years. **But the reason that we are spending our retirement doing this is because of our concerns about Climate Change and Pollution.**

When we renewed our relationship with Britannia in 2013, we set up the **Britannia Sailing Trust**, with the objectives of a) restoring her, b) teaching people the skills of shipwrighting and traditional sailing, and c) using her to campaign about pollution of the seas. This is now a hot topic, - rightly so, and it is more important than ever that we achieve our goal of getting her seaworthy again as quickly as possible. Time is running out – teaching young folk to sail a large boat using just wind power might be essential when we have to stop using fossil fuels!



**Funds are short and we could do with more help in lots of different ways.** We held a very enjoyable event in Winkleigh Village Hall at the end of April, **where a wonderful group of singers and musicians from Exmoor, called the Acorns, came to do a fundraising concert for us.** Everyone who came enjoyed the night and we are hoping to bring them back again

before too long. **We raised just over £500** so were very pleased with the result.

**Thanks** need to go to Chris and John for running the bar, Lenice, Duncan, Kay and Tony Aston of Granton S'pies for providing the delicious food, Ann for running the raffle and minding the door, Alan for his gorgeous donations to the raffle, and everyone who helped us to decorate the hall and clear up afterwards. And of course, we are REALLY grateful to the Acorns, who sang for us for nothing and were fabulous, no other word for it! So good, and so professional.

And lastly we have an amazing coincidence to reveal. We sold Britannia after owning her for 23 years, in 1996, and until we came across her in Brixham, we had no knowledge of her. But we discovered a few weeks ago that a very good friend of two members of the Acorns is a sailor too, and it turns out that he lives in North Devon. So one evening, whilst they were chatting in the pub, Tony and Meg were talking about the gig they were planning to do for us, and showed John our leaflet, and he realised that she was the very same ship that he had skippered for the new owners between 1996 and 2002 when they sold her! He came to visit us and I guess was a bit shocked at the state of her, but he loves her too and shared some good memories of his time sailing her. She is gradually drawing to her all the people that care about her – hopefully we will do her proud!

## Winkleigh Biodiversity Group

This year a group of keen volunteers has continued to manage the **Biodiversity Area at Winkleigh Memorial Recreation Fields**, in order to provide a diverse habitat for wildlife and to develop a pleasant outdoor space for local people to enjoy. You can find it next to the Tennis Courts.

The first trees were planted in December 2012 with a second planting in 2014. Some of these trees have now grown into young saplings. The white-flowering Wild Cherry, Whitebeam, Hawthorn and Rowan provide nectar for pollinating insects and later on, berries in the autumn - food for birds and small mammals.

The grass path within the Spiral Maze has been cut by Tim Roberts of Punchardon Farm, Winkleigh. This allows flowering plants such as Lady's Smock (or "Cuckoo Flower") and Knapweed ("Hardheads") to thrive. The nettles provide food for Red Admiral, Peacock and Tortoiseshell caterpillars. The grasses are food-plants for caterpillars of the Meadow Brown, Skipper and Ringlet butterfly, which are abundant there each July.

In April 2018, we planted some Alder Buckthorn bushes, which are the primary food-plant for the yellow Brimstone butterfly, and we are hoping to establish a colony there.

In November and March this year we have planted a further 100 trees from the Woodland Trust, as part of the Centenary Woods, within the existing spiral



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hedgerow. This brings us to a total of 350 trees planted on site, with 15 species of native trees.

We continue to send in records to the Devon Biodiversity Records Centre (<http://www.dbr.org.uk/>), including butterfly species, wild flowers, insects and birds.

We are also encouraging people to take part in the Devon Bat Survey – most of Winkleigh is now covered, but if you live outside the village, why not arrange to have a bat detector located in your garden for 3 nights (before October): see <http://devonbatproject.org/devon-bat-survey/>

We also occasionally meet for a social evening drink or visit someone's farm or garden. We call that "**Green Drinks**". If you would like to join in with any of our activities, we don't charge a membership fee, and everyone is welcome.

The Parish Council is governed by rules set out in the Local Government Act 1972 (section 137) which states **the money must be spent on purposes for the direct benefit of the parish and be commensurate with the expenditure incurred**, for example, spending a large amount for the benefit of only one or two people is not acceptable.


