Chain's Report SPRING 2025

LIVES IN A LANDSCAPE: Collecting stories about movers and shakers in the village is The Winkleigh Society's follow up to the oral histories collected by Gillian Holman and Peter Monkcom in 1997 for **The Winkleigh Book project**.

In the last three editions of D.W. we have reproduced the story of Ron Peachey, the London lad who was evacuated to Winkleigh during WW2 where he had the time of his life.

When the war was over and evacuees were going home Ron was desperate to stay in Winkleigh and begged to be adopted. He had become a bell-ringer, a butcher's boy and loved to help out with the harvests and the heavy horses. He fetched water from the pump for the kind widow who hosted him [and another evacuee] in her tiny cottage on Church Hill. Ron's parents never visited or sent parcels but Ron was no shirker, worked his passage and revelled in every aspect of village life including school [Headmaster Mr Melhuish] which he described as 'wonderful'.

Many years later he returned to the village with his wife and stayed in Vine Street at **Deanne Whittaker's** B&B. Very unwell by this time: his wife told Deanne that Ron's abiding happy childhood memory was his time in Winkleigh and that this visit was profoundly important for him.

Deanne asked questions and encouraged Ron's wife to write his story. When Deanne received the letter containing Ron's story she passed it on to Gillian Holman who was collecting stories for the Winkleigh oral history project **It's Living History isn't it?** Ron's story is the only one in that collection that was not tape-recorded.

The Winkleigh Society is still collecting stories about local heroes in the village and regularly feature them in **Our Lives in a Landscape** series. In this edition we are telling the story of **Hazel Pike** who left money for the improvement and refurbishment of the Winkleigh Surgery.

UPDATE ON WINKLEIGH SOCIETY WORK

We had a visit from two Conservators from the South West archive based at Exeter to look at the Winkleigh Archive in Winkleigh Community Centre.

They advised us [Barbara and Barry Jenkins, Godfrey Rhodes, Penny and Philip Griffiths] how best to store photographs and documents so they do not deteriorate and can be displayed properly.

There is a very extensive Winkleigh archive in Barnstaple [Top floor of the library] overseen and catalogued by archivist **Gary Naggs**. The Winkleigh Society pays an annual subscription towards the upkeep of this impressive facility. As a result we are invited every year for a talk and tour.

Gary will be retiring shortly but his assistant Tyler Pollard will be taking over the post. Gary stressed that the archive is available to all on request and for a set fee the archivist will get out relevant documents and assist with research. Interested? Ring Barnstaple Library and Archive and book a time slot. It is a treasure trove

of maps, charters, land deeds and Parish politics [bastardy records and runaway apprentices] going back hundreds of years.

I contacted Bill Horner Devon's chief archaeologist and thanked him for providing the visualisations of Romano British Winkleigh in our previous edition. Bill and his Historic Environment team have plans for more research on Winkleigh's early medieval history under the Monument Management Scheme. We visited the South West Heritage centre in Exeter in March by invitation of Brian Carpenter [conservator].

Our annual General meeting will be held on April 11th. We always do it cafe-style and make it interactive. All welcome.

Parish Church News

One of the most delightful sights on a dull day at this time of year is the bright yellow of daffodils. As the long, dark days of winter draw to a close, they herald the start of (hopefully) better days to come. Daffodils always seem so cheerful whatever the weather. They seem to withstand the wind and rain far better than anything else, almost stoically taking a stand against the battering weather. Defiantly bringing brightness to the world. William Wordsworth describes them perfectly in his poem 'Daffodils' when he wrote 'The waves beside them danced; but they out-did the sparkling waves in glee:'

Daffodils are widely seen as a symbol of life and hope. The Romans are said to have planted daffodils in memory of comrades fallen in battle or of loved ones who had died. It is likely that it was the Romans who brought them to Britain with them from their native Spain and Portugal. They are also said to be the flowers given and received on a tenth wedding anniversary.

Daffodils it seems also have links with the clergy. The Rev George Herbert Engleheart, vicar of Appleshaw in Hampshire, who clearly had time on his hands, is credited with breeding 720 varieties between 1882 and 1923. Apparently, his parishioners used to find a note on the church door saying 'no service today, working with daffodils'. I'm not quite sure what the Bishop would think today!

Daffodils are however often associated with our celebration of Easter as they remind us that from the dark and soggy winter earth and a rather unattractive bulb – something beautiful and bright can burst forth. A splash of colour too in the seeming endless darkness and dreariness of the world. These signs of new life and hope remind us of Jesus' death and resurrection and the promise for us all that death does not have the final say. A reminder too that in the seemingly dark events of the world around us, that there is always some hopeful light and colour brightening the gloom. We explore these themes of light and darkness, joy and hope as we journey together through Lent and Holy Week. All are welcome to join us as we remember the events of Christ's passion and rejoice in his glorious resurrection.

From your **Devon**County Councillor



When I last wrote for Distinctly Winkleigh in the autumn last year, it is safe to say the landscape of Local Government in Devon has been completely upended by some dramatic announcements by the national Government in London.

In short, just before Christmas, the Government published the English Devolution White Paper. Within that policy document the Government made it clear that they wish to see the reorganisation of local government in all two-tier areas, of which we in Winkleigh and in Devon are a part of.

Let me be clear, this is not optional. The County Council will be abolished. Torridge District Council will be abolished. Both DCC and TDC and the other Devon Districts including West Devon, Mid Devon and North Devon will all be replaced by a new 'single tier' unitary authority.

What size and shape this new unitary council will be is yet to be decided and will be the subject of intense discussions for most of this year. How long this will all take is also unclear as I will explain.

However, what will remain are the Town and Parish Councils. And so, when we do eventually move to this new structure there is going to have to be a stronger role for Parish Councils, like Winkleigh Parish Council, to deliver local services on the ground. Especially if we end up being part of a large unitary council that covers most of the geography of Devon.

Although the size and shape of the new council(s) is yet to be decided, the Government have made it clear that they expect the new unitary councils to have a population of at least 500,000. There will be some exceptions, but they

will have to prove that they are a high growth area with thousands of new homes being planned in the area. Devon County Council's population area covers 800,000. If you include Plymouth and Torbay (currently two small unitary councils) the population rises to 1.2 million.

The Government have also indicated that they wish to see small unitary authorities part of this discussion so, whether we like it or not, Plymouth and Torbay will be part of this ongoing discussion.

So, at the time of writing (end of February), where are we now? Currently the Government have instructed all councils in Devon – the 8 Districts, the County Council and the Plymouth and Torbay unitary councils – to submit an 'interim plan' to the Government by the **21st March**. They then expect full and final proposals to be submitted by **28th November**. If the Minister accepts the proposal, they would then, according to his letter to local councils, look to hold elections to the new 'shadow' unitary council(s) as soon as possible.

Despite this, there will still be County Council Elections in May this year, so whatever interim plans are submitted the 'new' County Council in May might decide to choose a different course. That is their prerogative but regardless of what does happen in May, I think it is important that all Councils in Devon engage on this. If we do not, quite simply we will have something imposed on us from Westminster whether we like it or not. That may yet still happen, but it is less likely if we work together to come up with some viable local proposals that best serve the residents of Winkleigh and Devon.

I also think, regardless of what happens in the elections in May, that it is in the interests of *all* residents here to get an agreement quickly on what the new Council will look like. The longer this process gets dragged out then the more money it will consume, the more decisions that will get delayed, and the more council services that will be reduced while your council tax bills increase even further.

Uncertainty is not good for local government. In the next County Council term and within the next two years, the contracts for Highways, Library Services and Youth Services are up for renewal. If by 2026 we still don't know what the shape of the new council(s) will look like, that is going to make awarding new contracts extremely difficult. Either short term contract extensions or temporary in-housing pending a breakup of the County Council will be expensive options... and the more these kinds of costs go up the less money there is for day to day services like repairing roads or collecting bins.

As Cabinet Member for Workforce on the County Council, I am extremely concerned about the impact this uncertainty will have on the council workforce. If officials leave due to job insecurity, replacing those people – particularly if that post is due to disappear in the reorganisation – becomes very difficult. Most likely in this scenario, we will see an increase in agency staffing costs and that in turn puts more pressure on day-to-day services.

So, as I said before, that is why it is in all of our interests to get the future shape of local government in Devon at least settled this year. The practicalities and challenges of reorganising into the new Council we can deal with, but what I don't want to see is that process dragged out by indecision and delay.

If we get this right, then you the reader of Distinctly Winkleigh should not notice any difference other than a change in Council branding to the new unitary authority when the time comes. But if this gets dragged out or things go wrong, then as I outlined above I fear it will start to have an impact on you.

In the meantime, I will be working closely with other councillors and council officials to help develop the interim proposals to the Government in March.

I did wonder, in light of elections now happening in May, whether the County Council should submit anything to the Government and just wait until after the elections take place. However, I was elected to represent all of the people of Torrington Rural and, given the very clear instruction by Government to submit an interim plan in March, it would be a gross dereliction of duty to just sit on my hands and do nothing, and potentially let other councils like Exeter, Plymouth and Torbay dictate as to how Winkleigh and Torrington Rural should be represented in the future. I doubt the Government would give any serious weight to a retrospective DCC submission if we just sat on our hands and did nothing prior to May.

So, needless to say I will be doing a lot of work in March on what the future of local government here will look like. Hopefully for the next edition of Distinctly Winkleigh there will be more clarity.

In the meantime, the day to day work of the County Council continues and if there are any issues you'd like to contact me about please do.

From your District Councillor

WHERE DO WE GO NEXT?

With the development of the Townsend Hill and Great Well Park estates well underway, and with the Western Barn site (former Kingsley Plastics factory) likely to start in the near future, the needs of Winkleigh are clearly changing (whether you think this is good or bad, it is a fact). So where should the village go from now?

RETAIL

Although a shadow of the 14 former retail premises that could be found around the village centre in days of old, the village is still well-served having two pubs, a butcher, post office, hairdresser, florist, cafes, two small garages, a vet and half a village shop (surely could be better?). Perhaps there is an opportunity to take advantage of passing trade on the A3124 and B3220 – I note that there is no modern fuel service station for nearly 30 miles between Crediton and Torrington so such a facility might benefit local residents as much as passing travellers?

COMMUNITY

The village is well served by the two halls that host numerous activities, the churches and of course the expanding Sports Centre (soon to be connected by a light-controlled crossing over the A3124) courtesy of s106 money from the new developments. Plans for a footpath running on down to Winkleigh woods will also be a real bonus.

EMPLOYMENT

I recently attended the excellent Business Breakfast held in the

Community Centre and organized by the Parish Council – a really good and overdue initiative to bring the various businesses that surround Winkleigh "in from the cold" and to listen to their needs and concerns. It is a shame that more high-quality businesses have not yet been attracted to the Airfield following the Kingsley Plastics example although the Economic Development team at Torridge District Council are working hard on it! However, the expansion of the Beechlea Industrial Estate, with over 20 businesses (more to follow) employing nearly 150 people is a good example of steady organic growth responding to local demand.

Change is often difficult to accept but must always be embraced. Some, I know, would rather that the village remained as it was, however many accept that everything is constantly evolving and that change will always bring new and better opportunities if approached with a positive attitude. For example, in this day of internet and supermarket shopping, our shops and pubs need more customers in order to remain viable – this in turn generates greater competition leading to an improved service for local residents. Don't be afraid of change – embrace it and make it work to your advantage!

LOCAL POLITICS



Meet the councillor - Pauline Odulinski OBE

Pauline's professional and personal skills are put to good use in her role for Winkleigh Parish Council

Pauline Odulinski OBE enjoys living in Winkleigh – a lot. And because she cares about the village and its community, this helps her play an important role on the parish council, on which she has served for the past two years.

Speaking at Catkin Blooms café, which she frequents regularly, Pauline moved to Winkleigh some 10 years ago. She noticed immediately how friendly the local people were. "They were so welcoming and willing to help. When a place came up on the parish council, I thought I might be able to contribute, and it seemed like an opportunity to give back." This is something of an understatement as she is highly qualified and has a proven track record.

Pauline's background is in further and higher education, and she was awarded an OBE for her contribution to further & higher education. She is a former Principal & C.E.O. of Aylesbury FE & HE College and has worked in an advisory role for several educational bodies as well as being a Fellow and visiting professor for Buckinghamshire New University. She is someone who believes in fairness and in life-long learning. "My passion is helping people, equality of opportunity for all and education is a gateway to this." she says.

She remains concerned about the lack of facilities for young people in Winkleigh, "currently there is little for young people to do for social activity, although there is a new youth club at the sports centre, there is a need for more variety to meet the needs of young people." One option is Young Farmers who meet monthly in Winkleigh — "we want people to realise that they don't need to be from a farming

family to participate in activities."

The Council has a street safety group, led by the "A" team (Andrew Warner, Andy Keys and Alan Jacobs), who spend time working in the environment to provide protection and safety for the community, for example, our green spaces, benches, paths and many other facilities.

Even in her two years on the parish council, Pauline can see Winkleigh is changing and will continue to do so as many more move into the village.

She has lived in densely populated areas before and, in part, it was the tranquillity of Winkleigh which attracted her to move — although as she points out, there are around 30 community clubs and groups here, so there is always plenty to do.

But, with a building boom in process, resulting in more than 300 new homes without all the important associated infrastructure, there will be a strain on local facilities such as school and healthcare and leading to a vast increase in traffic.

"We want to see sympathetic development in keeping with Winkleigh's character, which is already changing. It is disappointing that some of the estates have not been built within the guidance of the approved Neighbourhood Plan. I would also question how many of these homes are affordable and if they are within reach of local people who want to remain here."

Winkleigh Parish Council took a petition signed by most local people, who were opposed to the rapid expansion of the village without the appropriate infrastructure being provided. People were very unhappy about the fact this is happening on farmland, that the

appearance of many of the homes is more suited to an urban environment, as well as the lack of care for nature, such as with no wildlife corridors being provided and no EV charging points being supplied on the estate.

The parish council only has limited powers when it comes to stopping developments, but members are angry that these homes were not built in line with the Neighbourhood Plan requirements and that the views of so many continue to be ignored.

But, looking to the positives, she says the Council has produced a strategic vision and plan for the village, shortly to be provided for public consideration, to maintain the unique features of this important historic village as well as providing opportunities. For example, with a strategic plan we can bid for significant funding that could enable more investment into facilities for the village. We are conscious that building development has been focused on cars and roads and we would like to see more focus on solutions for pedestrians and cycles in a coherent plan. "We have playparks for small children but also a skatepark is one idea for older young people. It would also be good to see an expanded village shop and, as more people move in, this is a frequent request from our surveys. I'd like to see a residents' group get off the ground if we can engage more people to volunteer to join us."

Pauline is also closely involved with developing an important new initiative – the Winkleigh Community Awards, which will take place in summer 2025. 'It is important to recognise and value the contribution of the many people giving to the community's benefit and celebrate achievements.'

In terms of encouraging young people to take part, she has already spoken to the Head of Chulmleigh Community College about the writing competition which is to be about "place and belonging" and Winkleigh Primary School is supportive too.

Pauline is now actively promoting the awards, and she adds that there are often

places available for newcomers to the parish council. "Many will know Angela Findlay, who chaired the parish council, and is now leaving the area. I find this work rewarding and we'd love to welcome others who may wish to offer their services; we are a very small group at present – and a few more women would be good too as I'm currently the only one! We need more diversity so please can I urge people to think about it"

GARDEN NOTES

Spring planting and protecting early growth - frost free tender tips



Even plants which are hardy and can survive hard winters can have their new growth damaged by unexpected frosts. Pleasantly warm days, as we often have scattered in late winter or early spring can break dormancy for many plants and seeds and encourage early, or even premature tender young growth. This is the time of year when gardeners are well advised to keep an eye on the forecast for overnight temperatures. If it looks to be frosty (anywhere below 5 degrees can be an issue for some plants) and if some of your plants are putting on unseasonably enthusiastic soft green growth, do consider giving them a fleecy shelter overnight, it doesn't take much to keep the worst off.

Whilst your more tender plants are no doubt still tucked away in a heated greenhouse, or wrapped in frostproof outbuildings, a little fleece goes a long way for the tougher regular with early soft parts. Some plants are too big to practically fleece, though in the past it wasn't unheard of for a late frost to be greeted by fires trying to save early blossom in orchards, more often now we hope for enough varieties with different windows for flowering to improve the chances of any losses to frost damage to be only small. In the domestic garden though moving pots to sheltered sunny spots, and wrapping



tender tips could just be enough to save the young growth. Every plant has different levels of cold tolerance - the RHS website is a reliable source of reference for knowing which of your garden favourites need first dibs on the garden duvets.

MARCH

- Protect new spring shoots from slugs with barriers
- Where needed prepare to apply nematodes for slugs once soil reaches 5 degrees c
- Plant shallots, onion sets and early potatoes
- Plant summer-flowering bulbs if in doubt plant bulbs 3x size of bulb deep
- Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials
- Top dress containers with fresh compost
- Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed)
- Cut back Cornus (dogwood) and Salix (willow) grown for colourful winter stems
- Hoe and mulch weeds to keep them under control early
- Start feeding fish and using the pond fountain; remove pond heaters
- Prune bush and climbing roses

APRIL

- · Keep weeds under control
- Protect fruit blossom from late frosts
- · Tie in climbing and rambling roses
- Sow hardy annuals, herbs and wild flower seed outdoors
- Start to feed citrus plants
- Increase the water given to houseplants
- · Feed hungry shrubs and roses
- Sow new lawns or repair bare patches
- · Prune fig trees
- · Divide bamboos and waterlilies

No-Mow May

Consider leaving at least a part of your lawn to grow longer during no mow May (ideally treat it as a mini meadow and leave until autumn).

It attracts a wider range of wildlife many of whom are beneficial in a garden setting. Better to leave a smaller patch for longer duration. Long grass encourages wildlife like butterflies to lay eggs, deciding the end of May is as long as you can bear it can mean you then destroy the nursery just as they hatch.

MAY

- Watch out for late frosts. Protect tender plants
- Earth up potatoes, and promptly plant any still remaining
- Plant out summer bedding at the end of the month (except in cold areas)
- Water early and late to get the most out of your water, recycle water when possible
- Regularly hoe off weeds
- Open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days
- Mow lawns being maintained as lawns weekly
- Check for nesting birds before clipping hedges
- Lift and divide overcrowded clumps of daffodils and other springflowering bulbs

For optimum wildlife benefit and conventional gardening comfort mow a boundary giving neat edges to your wild meadow patch, and if it's large enough a curved path wandering through can really balance any concerns about it looking neglected or being impractical and turn it into a beautiful feature. If you want more wildflowers to develop in your mini meadows you want weaker grass - plant plugs of yellow rattle in with the grass and it will grow using the grass for its nutrient support, so reducing the vigour of the grass giving more delicate wildflowers an easier time.





"O! but to breathe the breath Of the cowslip and primrose sweet—With the sky above my head, And the grass beneath my feet; For only one short hour To feel as I used to feel..."

The county flower, the Primrose (*Primula vulgaris*) and the related Cowslip (*Primula veris*) are both beneficial to bees, butterflies, moths and beetles (though mostly to those with longer tongues).

Devon banks around the local villages are often populated with primroses, and their benefit in gardens is no less lovely. They require very little care and will self seed happily producing a variety of colours, from the dominant yellow through to either white or pale pink.

Both plants enjoy the moisture retentive qualities of the local clay and will grow most places so long as they get some sunshine. With increasingly warm summers they're probably best in partial shade so they aren't totally baked in midsummer. Cowslips do prefer chalk and limestone but they are a tolerant little plant and can still cope with our local acidic clay so long as they aren't waterlogged in winter.

Being in the same genus it's not surprising to discover that they can hybridise too. The resultant crossed offspring are known as false oxlips (Primula veris x vulgaris) - the true oxlip (Primula elatior) is like a paler more open flowered cowslip.


Historically different parts of the plants have been used for various medical

treatments, and though the leaves are technically edible they can be more bitter than most people would like. Probably the most appealing use is of the flowers to make primrose or cowslip wine, but the quantities involved would take a heavy harvest and commercial cultivation nowadays so it's probably best we enjoy them for their visual appeal and invertebrate benefits.

Anyone wanting to grow primroses or cowslips in their garden should know taking them from the wild is illegal, though sharing from a generous neighbours garden will mean they are used to local conditions. When growing them from seed they should be sown in autumn for a spring display. Increasingly though these lovely wildflowers can be bought already in bud or flower.

April 19th is Primrose day, originating in the 19th century from Disraeli's love of the flower. Cowslips were traditionally picked on Mayday, though nowadays, with the understanding that our passing pleasures are less important than the core needs of wildlife for food, enjoying them insitu is preferable. Maybe taking time that day to go for a long primrose spotting walk around your nearby lanes and banks and meadows?

Views from the People and Planet Questionnaire

The People and Planet Questionnaire gathered 21 responses from local residents, with 66% of participants from Winkleigh and 33% from Hollocombe. The feedback highlights a strong desire within the community to tackle environmental issues and take action to improve the local area.

Key Environmental Priorities

When asked about the environmental issues they were most passionate about, respondents identified the following priorities:

- Wildlife conservation and recovery (86%)
- Water quality in rivers and streams (81%)
- Access to nature (71%)
- Pollution (air, water, light, soil) (57%)
- Recycling (47%)
- Climate Change (47%)

These responses reflect a clear commitment to protecting local wildlife, improving water quality and ensuring continued access to nature.

Personal Action and Community Engagement

An overwhelming 95% of respondents reported taking personal action to reduce their environmental impact 'almost always' or 'often'. Actions include reducing energy and water use, supporting local business, minimising car travel and purchasing sustainable products. These efforts show a proactive commitment to sustainable living within the community.

Barriers to Environmental Action

Despite the enthusiasm, some barriers to taking further environmental action were identified:

- Lack of time (mentioned by nearly half of the respondents)
- Lack of local groups
- · Financial constraints

These challenges may prevent individuals from engaging in additional environmental activities, though the desire for more involvement remains strong.

Preferred Local Initiatives

When it comes to local initiatives, residents expressed interest in joining the following:

- · Wildlife conservation activities
- Repair cafés or re-use schemes
- · Community clean-ups
- · Talks or walks in nature

Many people also suggested activities that could foster greater community involvement, including group litter picks, local walking or running groups, regular repair cafés, and a 'library of things' to borrow rather than buy. There was also a call to raise awareness of the climate emergency and attend Parish Council meetings to stay informed on local decisions that impact the environment.

Ideas for Improving the Local Area

Several ideas were shared to improve the environmental landscape of Winkleigh and Hollocombe, including:

- Community herb and fruit areas and planters for bulbs
- An off-road footpath to the woods to reduce car traffic and encourage walking
- A permeable cycle and footpath connecting new housing estates to the Sports Field, School, Airfield outlets and more
- Making the main road safer for pedestrians and cyclists to reduce reliance on cars
- Improving access to the bus shelter on the Exeter route, with a dry, permeable path to improve safety and reduce water run-off

These suggestions reflect a desire to make the community more connected, sustainable, and safer for all residents.

Looking Ahead

With commitment to action from a core group of people, our collective effort could bring real change. Let's work together to keep Winkleigh and Hollocombe beautiful, sustainable

and connected to the natural world around us.

In terms of future engagement,
90% of respondents expressed
a willingness to support new
environmental activities, either regularly
or occasionally. This enthusiasm gives
us an exciting opportunity for the
community to come together, build
upon these ideas, and make meaningful
strides toward a greener, more

sustainable future for our Parish.

Financial Focus - Tariffs and Conflict

Global markets remain poised at very high levels amid uncertainty over the behaviour and plans of Donald J Trump, 47'th President of the United States. Trump's intervention in global marketplaces via tariffs, autocratic style and his decision to speak directly with Putin regarding the Ukraine conflict, have caused widespread consternation. The full, long-term impact and ramifications of these brash decisions are still being coldly evaluated.

In March 2024, the UK CPI inflation reading was 3.2%. By September 2024, it had fallen to 1.7%. The following monthly readings were 2.5%, 2.6%, 2.5% and for January 2025, 3%. The anticipation was for a reading of 2.8%. Higher, and particularly consistently increasing, levels of inflation make it more difficult for the Bank of England to cut interest rates. This has been reflected by market participants no longer fully pricing in two cuts to UK interest rates this year. Whilst this may normally provide strength for the

pound, reaction was muted. Participants remain cautious.

Confidence in the ability of the Labour government to deliver on its growth plans appears depressed. The Bank of England said earlier this month that it had halved its growth forecast for 2025, from the 1.50% it was expecting in November 2024, to just 0.75%. Meanwhile, the cost of borrowing for the UK government has risen, whilst actual levels of borrowing continue to spiral - public sector net borrowing was £17.8BN in December, more than £10BN higher than a year earlier. Reeves has also changed the rules to facilitate a further £80BN of borrowing for infrastructure projects; a decision many market participants have taken a dim view of given the near 100% debt to GDP ratio the UK faces, compared to less than 45% before the financial crisis of 2007-2008. The Chancellor's fiscal headroom of £9.9BN evaporated within months of the budget announcement, whilst the party is in a straitjacket of its own making with respect to additional tax rises due to the pledges it has made to the electorate. Despite these pledges, many consider that without a sudden, growth miracle, Labour will be forced to implement additional tax rises on the electorate in short order.

The US, further to their recent election, now appears to be suffering a similar fate to the UK. A recent slew of data shows consumer confidence in January 2025 fell to the lowest level since August 2021, whilst long-term inflation expectations spiked to levels not seen since 1995. The services purchasing managers' index slipped into contraction, whilst home sales in January dropped more than experts

had predicted and the services sector displayed a dip in activity. According to S&P Global chief economist Chris Williamson, US businesses' optimism has evaporated amid a darkening picture of heightened uncertainty. The rally in technology stocks is also reversing amidst fears about China's Deepseek model, threatening to disrupt the technology marketplace with a cheaper alternative to western counterparts.

Trump is threatening harsh tariffs, with severe financial implications and consequences, against formerly friendly trading counterparts. His style of governance and the number of Executive Orders he has signed are a serious concern for many in Congress who fundamentally believe in democracy, whilst Trump is further incensing many people by extending overtures to Vladimir Putin. For clarity. an Executive Order is a written order issued by the president to the federal government which does not require congressional approval. Executive orders are controversial because they bypass approval from Congress, allowing the president to act on his own.

Europe's economic outlook and production figures remain relatively depressed. For example, new car sales in Europe were down by 2.10% in January, as a jump in fully electric and hybrid-electric car registrations in its main markets was not enough to compensate for falling petrol and diesel sales. The eurozone's two largest economies, Germany and France, both contracted in the fourth quarter, whilst the Italian economy stagnated. The German economy shrank by 0.2% in the final quarter of 2024 compared with the previous quarter and is forecast to grow

by just 0.30% this year.

2024 saw stock market valuations in developed and many developing nations, such as India, hit record highs. Many would argue a pullback and some profit taking was inevitable this quarter. Looking past the immediate doom and gloom and further into 2025 is difficult at present, due primarily to the new American president. His alarmingly autocratic style of governance is both impossible to ignore and extremely difficult to predict. The American economy is always significant due to its size, but prior to Trump's presidency it was a bright spot within a global economy that was widely struggling to gain traction. If America falters in 2025, it may have broad and potentially severe repercussions on the global economy.

Also in the global mix is inflation and the strength of the dollar; the latter has a knock-on effect to commodities as they are priced in dollars and also affects Emerging Markets which may often struggle in the face of a strong dollar. It is certainly a complicated narrative to navigate at present, but bright spots and winners may often be found and volatility may open up opportunities for the knowledgeable investor. Broadly speaking, market participants would appear to be taking some profits, but not panicking. This suggests that, underlying the immediate caution, there remains a broad sentiment that there are reasonable grounds to anticipate medium to longterm growth over the course of 2025.







the past to the present, specializing in the unforgettable melodies of the wartime years. Join us in celebrating this anniversary and come along in your 1940s garb – we certainly will!






He took me upstairs and reluctantly counted the filthy lucre, with a fastidiousness that made it clear that dealing with actual money was way below his paid grade and suit level.

WINKLEIGH Bell Ringers

The oldest, most significant building in Winkleigh is Winkleigh Parish Church All Saints. And the oldest, longest running society in Winkleigh has to be The Winkleigh Bell Ringers. All Saints church Bells have rung out across Winkleigh Parish for centuries. They rang in the reign of Elizabeth I to celebrate the victory over The Armada in 1558.

When clocks and timepieces were only for the rich, the morning bell rang to summon workers to work in the fields. The curfew bell sounded at 8 or

9 in the evening. The church pulpit was where royal proclamations were read out and the people were summoned there by the tolling of the bells.

They were silenced throughout World War 2 [1939 -1945]; but how they rang out across the land when victory was declared.

Bell ringing is not for the faint- hearted. Ringers' diaries are punctuated with the long established rituals of the church; Sunday morning services, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, New Years Eve, weddings, funerals and significant national events e.g. The Queen's funeral and the King's Coronation.

Jane Hill is Bell Captain. Ringers practice every Tuesday night from 7.30 to 9pm. Jane took over from Frank Pidgeon who was Bell Captain for fifty Years. Frank trained many bell ringers over the years as did Ken Brooke, another stalwart, who trained Andrew Ware.

Jane has been ringing since she was a young girl and is steeped in the traditions and discipline of this ancient practise. Climbing up the church tower on a cold January night to watch the ringers go through their paces, seeing the heft of the ropes, observing the stretch, effort, rhythm and concentration required from the ringers to create the bong that rings out into the night and across the village is to connect with History.

Impressive too is the loyalty of long established ringers, including Andrew Ware, Peter Penny & Roger Hill. There is also a keen 15 year old lad and [on the night I was there] visiting ringers from Coldridge.

Bell ringers across the region communicate and support each other with ringing tours and filling in for other churches when they need more crew. There are very few parishes in Devon which are outside 'the sound parish'. The Winkleigh All Saints bell-ringers belong to a community of enthusiasts dedicated to keeping this ancient art alive and sonorous.



A place to enjoy the view. That all sounds great to me, but what about you?



In memory of Antoinette Dean Kingspury

Toni would be very cross with me for submitting this trbute about her life here in Winkleigh and throughout Devonshire. She would never want to be in the limelight or praised.

always wanting to encourage others.

Therefore, this short summary is only a glimpse into her past life.

It was very fitting that her funeral service took place at Exeter Cathedral on the 22 January 2024. It was conducted by the Very Reverend Jonathan Greener Dean of the Cathedral and Canon Ian Morter.

It was gratifying to witness so many local attenders along with others from throughout Devonshire and further afield.

Toni was born in 1946 in Kilmarnock, her father was a Scot and her mother from Kent. They chose to live in Kent and it was there age 5 at Ham Hill School where she first met and sat next to lan- her future husband. We were married for 53 years and lived in Winkleigh from 1973, 52 years ago.

Toni had an aptitude for figures and worked for firms including the Reed Paper Group, Omega watch company and eventually for the National Cash Register company. She worked her way up the ranks and eventually installed accounting systems and trained others how to use them.

We both had good jobs and I suppose could be described, in terms of that era as, a "Pair of Yuppies". We chose to leave the rat race in Kent and, with another couple, bought and ran the Lymington Arms at Wembworthy.

Toni and I then purchased a Dairy, known as Kingsbury Dairy, moved to Winkleigh and added the Newsagents and bottled gas business, delivering to ten surrounding villages, along with two faithful employees Ann Parker and John Sowden.

That lasted some 43 years until retirement.

As if Toni did not have enough to do, she played a full part in village life, driving and delivering on her own rounds. She was a very kind person, always worrying about others, regarding her customers as friends. Especially the elderly who lived on their own, going in to make sure they were alright, fetching prescriptions or giving them time.

Toni was secretary to the Village Hall Committee, very often taking Natalie in her push chair!, Secretary to the Winkleigh Relief in Need Charity, teaching ballet at Beaford Art Centre and South Molton

She started the predecessor of Distinctly Winkleigh producing Country Mart, a village newsletter.

At the same time studying for her degree on an open university course.

The best summer ever of 1978, in Winkleigh, Toni gave birth to our daughter Natalie who now works in veterinary services in Wiltshire.

Toni enjoyed everything about Winkleigh until she became ill and diagnosed with PSP or Progressive Supranuclear Palsy becoming increasingly disabled cared for by me and the superb care of Jackie Bridgman who gave Toni comfort and dignity to the very end.
