2011 Summer Allotment Report

Well it's the third season now for the allotmenteers and all look really good and well cared for. We have water to the site, a large storage shed and many of the allotments have their own small sheds, the latter saving the growers from having to carry tools back and forth from home.

Several new and sturdy fruit frames have gone up over the past year and now we see the young fruit canes looking healthy and some already showing immature fruit. Much lip smacking at the thought (and hope) of what they should produce later it the season. A number of other structures have gone up, some raised beds which should make it less back breaking work as the gardeners as well as the plots mature, one or two cold frames have appeared and it is amazing to see how many different methods of support there are for runner beans and other climbers.

By now many of us have a good idea of which crops like the situation and soil on the sports field and settle for those things which we are fairly confident of cropping well. Other sturdier souls continue to do battle with troublesome things which are susceptible to disease and infestation, trying different varieties and treatments in the hope of solving problems previously encountered.

This time I'm afraid we have no new recipes for you. Ivor was unwell for some time and not able to chase people for these and unless we get contributions we can't include them, so please readers, one and all, not just allotment holders, new recipes for using home grown fruit and vegetables, particularly those likely to produce a glut. It would be good to have a bumper crop of ideas for cooking as well a bumper crop for eating.

OUR COMMUNITY CENTRE

Winkleigh Community Assets Trust (WCAT) was registered on April 15^{th} as the registered owner of the Community Centre. It really is now ours – as is the responsibility for it to become a thriving community asset!

WCAT is set up as a company limited by guarantee and without shares, for charitable purposes. Its aim is to benefit the community of Winkleigh and its neighbouring areas, and to do this it may hold assets and carry out a wide variety of activities. We are greatly indebted to the gallant efforts of those that preceded us in the fight to gain control the Community Centre, and hope to build on many of the structures set up by them in the years to come.

The building, until now maintained by the voluntary efforts of many willing helpers, now faces a very different situation! Although the fabric of the Community Centre is basically solid, a considerable amount of repair and refurbishing has to be done. Improvement of heating is also needed for the Main and Smaller rooms to increase usage of the facilities during the cold months

A recent appeal, initiated by Maggie Wykes, to raise funds to help with this raised over £420 – a big **Thank You** to Maggie and all those who contributed! On top of this, the Chigong Group has generously donated £750 to help with the project.

We can save substantially on labour costs by doing much of the work ourselves. A small team has started work on the kitchen area – both internally and externally. The inside of the two rooms will get some temporary repairs to plasterwork and a new coat of paint; this will give us a chance to examine the nature of the problems in the walls, windows and roof where damp is getting into the fabric.

Winkleigh Rethinkly

It's a shame to spoil a good mattress by filling it with freshly minted twenty pound notes. But where should we put our money? These last two years economists are all at sixes and sevens. Just like the politicians. So complex are our living systems nowadays that even experts and professionals get lost. Perhaps not enough so.

We were puzzling what to do with the money that our mother left us. The stock market and property market were in an early stage of meltdown. One friend said she grew up in a house filled to the rafters with bottles of whisky – her father's hedge against inflation. But that was in another country.

Another friend told us about DARE – the Devon Association for Renewable Energy in North Tawton, (http://www.devondare.org) who are independent and non-profit making. This time last year Fukoshima had not yet happened. However rising gas and oil prices were certainly making their dent in our budget and the advance of global warming was clearly evident in the woods and hedgerows around us. DARE pointed us towards solar panels for generating electricity and heating our water - and reducing our carbon footprint.

From a long list of alternative energy installers, we chose a firm to install nineteen panels of photo-voltaic (PV) cells that magically generate electricity and two panels that heat our water when the sun shines. Which it's done rather a lot lately.

There are no direct grants for this installation but so clear and outstanding are the prospects of diminishing resources and worsening climate that the government rewards producers of alternative energy. We are paid a "feed-in" tariff of around 41.3 pence for every unit and the Electricity Company pay us 3p for half of what we produce. This represents a more or less ten percent return on our investment. Beat that Mr Gates. And the latest electricity bill comes to less than a quarter of the one for this time last year.

Here's a paradox. We need to do something – the world's in a mess. Whatever we do – we make it worse. All the world's problems stem from man himself.

But here's a way out. The sages and wise men have told us that if we want to change the world we have to change ourselves; our beliefs and our old inherited habits and our assumptions. For solutions we have to look within not without. We have to change ourselves.

It feels good these days walking with a lighter footprint on this earth and not sleeping on a mattress full of money.

ACE Archaeology Club

Preparations for the Festival of Archaeology and Old Technology on Saturday the 23rd of July are well under way and, like last year, this will be held at Pattiland Farm, Broadwoodkelly. Over the past few months we have been clearing the scrub at Moistown in readiness for the earthwork and dowsing survey, this work has revealed a large hollow and a glimpse of a very thick wall. As well as this we have been building three bread ovens, each having a different construction method - it will be interesting to see which one works best. The grain has been purchased for Sue Watts to grind in her quern and we have sown a small patch of it on site. Visitors to the festival will be able to see bread making from the growing wheat to the finished loaf, as well as have a go at dowsing and surveying. There are lots of other things to see and do; exhibitions, local arts and crafts, ancient televisions, old tractors and lots more, check the ACE website for more information. This event is ACE's contribution to this year's Council for British Archaeology's Festival of British Archaeology. Meanwhile back in the land of the Archaeology and Bracken project. Dr Sandy Gerrard has made great progress on the report of the roundhouse excavation, not only has he got to interpret the archaeology but also try to work out what the bracken rhizomes have done to it! Providing he does not get too many interruptions he is hoping to have the bulk of it written by the end of this May. In June we will be showing representatives from English Heritage, the National Trust and Cornwall County Council how to assess what damage bracken could be doing to monuments in their care.

As if this was not enough to keep us all busy this summer we also have a guided walk on Dartmoor which finishes up at our guide's home for a barbeque. I just hope we have good weather, or was April the new August?!

House Scouts and Explore North Devon

The last time I sat down to write the House Scouts article for Distinctly Winkleigh I was feeling quite depressed, we were about to lose the Community Centre, which amongst other things is home for the Winkleigh archive. The only hope was for a fairy godmother or knight in shining armour to step in to save the day, and sure enough they did! The Community Centre now belongs to Winkleigh and the archive that has being growing over the past 8 years is safe. You can view the digital and physical archive on the first Wednesday every month at the mini market between 9.00 and 10.30 am.

Through the Winkleigh Society website www.winkleighonline.com we quite often get enquiries to House Scouts from folks studying their family tree, or `offering items for the archive. In May this year we received an email from Sylvia Robinson (nee Audley) who lives in the United States. She was evacuated to Winkleigh in 1942 from Liverpool and stayed at a farm run by the Earle family. She remembers Mr and Mrs Earle and their two teenage daughters with much affection as they were so kind and helped her get over feeling home sick. Sylvia made friends with the farm's horse named Flower and loved to wander in the fields, she also attended Winkleigh Primary School (1942- 44). She could not remember where the farm was as she was only five years old at the time and now dearly wanted to know because it had played an important part in her life.

I printed out her email and took it to the mini market to show to some of the regulars, hey presto Betty Heggadon knew the Earle's farm, it was Gerrydown, just off the edge of the Airfield, also her Husband Cyril remembered the two daughters Marion and Mona (who have sadly both passed away), as he lived in the farm next door. So, while I was able to email Sylvia the good news, it is a shame that we do not have any old photographs of Gerrydown Farm as I am sure that she would love to see them. Please do get in touch with me if you have any memories or photos and I can copy them and pass them on to Sylvia.

House Scouts is doing its bit for Winkleigh Fair, on Friday the 15th July there will be a village heritage walk ending at the Community Centre, where the archive and various exhibitions will be on view, also refreshments will be available. Check the Winkleigh Fair program for details.

LITTLE ACORNS

Little Acorns is a small registered care home for people with learning disabilities and on the autistic spectrum, situated opposite Zuki's restaurant at Seckington Cross. Most of our service users (the name we give people who live in the Home) are from Devon, as we pride ourselves on offering placements for "local" people, so that family and friends can pop in and see them frequently.

Little Acorns is home to 6 service users at the moment; when our "new build" is complete towards Autumn 2011, we will be able to offer more accommodation opportunities to people from our client group, in addition to offering a sound proofed recording studio in the "new build".

Our aim is to work within the local community and integrate our service users, as much as possible, into community life. This way we can encourage socialisation within the larger community, and give our service users the opportunity to meet people outside of the Home, learn to value diversity in people, and, hopefully, be valued in return. We also promote self determination, responsibility and life skills for all our service users and offer everyone here the opportunity to make real choices in the manner of their lives.

Currently, we have several ongoing life skill projects including horticulture, animal husbandry, and free range poultry rearing. In addition to the pure pleasure that our service users gain, simply from being around, and petting, the animals, they also learn the importance of looking after other living beings. We are fortunate to have been gifted several animals by local people, all of whom are incorporated into our PAT (pets as therapy) scheme. People on the autistic spectrum, who can often be affected by sensory impairment, really enjoy touching a variety of things.

Little Acorns has been around for 4 years now and we are celebrating our 4th anniversary by way of our annual fete on Saturday 2nd July 2011, an event to which everyone is welcome!

This year, the fete will also host the magnificent covers band "Thick As Thieves", who will perform live for everyone in the evening. We will be open from 2pm to 10pm, and with homemade refreshments, stalls, raffles, tombola, games for young people, music by the Little Acorns buskers, a barbeque and a temporary alcohol licence in place, fun will be had by all!

THURSDAY CHIGONG AND TAICHI CLASSES

The morning class has grown and moved across to the village hall. We still start at 10.30 a.m. and practice until 11.30. This seems to be the shortest hour of the week as we are all amazed when time is up. It is the way of Chigong that you are totally involved in every movement you make. Focused and aware of your breathing and body, you gradually develop a better relationship with yourself. At the end of a class you feel more relaxed and more alive.

The word Chigong may be intimidating and mysterious when you have not experienced or seen the exercises. But anyone who wishes to come and learn will find something in this for themselves.

Because the class is weekly (mostly), drop in, pay as you go, and not run as a course or series of courses. I have been asked how people progress - I think the answer is that it is not so much about the difficulty of any exercise, as any exercise can be adapted and used by any one at any level.

We all come with our different abilities and experiences and this is only the starting point.

Chigong is a huge and wonderful ancient and living movement and anyone can join in.

Here in Winkleigh I do it my way and the way of the members in the class they actually lead me. The whole thing is a lovely experience and we do progress, and laugh and care about each other.

The morning class is followed by Tai chi until 12 noon.

The afternoon class still meets at 4.45 - 5.45 p.m. in the small room of the community centre.

This is a smaller class more dedicated to those with specific health issues - in theory. But in the spirit of Chigong anything is OK. We do the same exercises but with the emphasis on the members particular needs. There is discussion, and lots of camaraderie and support. Anyone is welcome and there is room in this class for new members.

WINKLEIGH PARISH COUNCIL

CHAIRMANS REPORT 2010---2011

Heads banging against brick walls, water dripping inexorably on stone, going round in ever decreasing circles etc. etc. etc.....These are some of the rather trite sayings which come to mind when we find ourselves yet again having to respond to yet another draft of the Core Strategy, or arguing Housing Allocations with T.D.C.'s Planning Dept., or attending seemingly endless meetings on traffic calming with Highways, having sent what seem to us to be extremely concise and rationally argued letters!

Nevertheless, there seem to be a few lights at the end of what appeared to be interminable tunnels, and so, onwards and upwards and if you would like to know exactly where we are heading, do read on.

PLANNING

CORE STRATEGY

Having formulated many responses to North Devon and Torridge District Council's Core Strategy documentation, we have been informed that there will be yet another re-draft of this to be considered in the near future. The reasons for this is that a Government directive has been issued, decreeing that the R.S.S. [Regional Spatial Strategy], should be scrapped, and as this was integrally entwined with the Core Strategy, the Core Strategy will not now be published until the end of 2012.

The Core Strategy and the Settlement Assessment will dictate planning policies until 2026 and are rather important documents, so we are concentrating on making our views and opinions known in our many responses on these issues. However, the government's Localism Bill, which is due to be adopted towards the end of this year, may cast a different light on these deliberations.

AIRFIELD SITE DEVELOPMENT BRIEF

The S.D.B. is not a policy document, but feeds into the Core Strategy as a Supplementary Planning Document. However since the Core Strategy has been delayed, so too has the S.D.B.

A reminder that it contains the following statement -

- 1. No provision for housing on the airfield.
- 2. Any further planning applications there will have to comply with policy for sites in the open countryside.
- 3. Development will be focussed on the central and southern parts of the site, but no specific area has been targeted.

HOUSING

In the results of our Parish Plan, 83% of the respondents indicated that they thought:

- 1. The village is large enough already
- 2. There is a definite need for some affordable housing.
- 3. New houses should be in keeping architecturally and that indigenous materials and designs should be employed.
- 4. Energy saving techniques should be used

At the time of writing this we are anticipating that a member of the Settlement Assessment team at T.D.C. will be coming to enlighten us on any future obligations as far as housing is concerned.

We will, of course, echo the views of our parishioners, who may welcome small brownfield and infill housing development, but who do not wish any more large estates.

Although, at last, T.D.C. has developed an Empty Houses Policy, there seems to be little pro-activity in this area and we must urge them to commit to the occupation of empty housing in our parish before commencing new development.

As for the present, officers at T.D.C. have been instructed to work to the existing Local Plan boundaries when dealing with applications.

HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

As mentioned in my report from last year, the traffic calming measures on Townsend Hill are still ongoing. We have kept up the momentum by having meetings with Mr Newcombe and Mr Anstee of Devon County Highways Dept. We have also lobbied our County Councillor, Andy Boyd, who happens to be chairman of H.A.T.O.C. [Highways and Traffic Orders Committee], who has assured us that this scheme has their full backing and is a top priority for this financial year.

We have had letters of support from Jane Rivans of Winkleigh Primary School, Anna Bridgman, chair of Winkleigh Pre School and Geoffrey Cox M.P. These letters have been sent to all members of H.A.T.O.C. requesting that they look favourably on our constant submissions [over a period of 6 years!] and in the hope that the safety of our children will be of paramount importance.

Our Vice Chair Peter Stutt and I met with James Anstee in Barnstaple as recently as March of this year and were assured that, if the monies were available in the new financial year, there may be a positive outcome. W.P.C. has a copy of the proposed plans for traffic calming and these can be seen on application.

The lighting for these works would continue the changeover to white lights which was recommended by the police and which has already started in parts of Winkleigh. Obviously there would be a consultation period for those who live near the road.

WINTER GRIT SCHEME

Our Snow Warden and Emergency Plan Officer, Gareth Cooper, reported back to us from a conference at the Met. Office on Winter Service Reviews. We were told last autumn that only major roads would be gritted as part of a cost cutting exercise. We therefore decided to purchase a small salt sprayer to mainly tackle pavements around the village.

Our County Councillor, Andy Boyd, has suggested that he could supply a grit spreader that could be towed behind a large vehicle which would cope with minor roads. This could be shared with neighbouring villages and we will be discussing these possibilities in the near future. Many thanks to Gareth and the Tidy Group for making our village a safer place.

MEDICAL MATTERS

The Wallingbrook Practice have had their surgeries assessed by documentation from the C.Q.C. [Care Quality Commission] and some of the problems which we have shown concerns about in the past have been highlighted. These are: poor disabled access along the ramp and through the narrow front door and lack of a disabled toilet.

Work has now commenced and I have spoken to Andrew Waite, an officer at T.D.C., about these alterations. The angle of the ramp and the width of the front door are apparently in compliance. However, an additional outer rail has been attached to the ramp and the steps up to the front door are being made shallower. The step at the front door will be removed to aid access as will the inner door. A doorbell, disability signs and an external light will be put in place. The reception desk has to be lowered and a deaf loop added. Our thanks to T.D.C. and the Practice for their speedy actions. We hope that we can improve communications with the Practice for the greater benefit of our residents

Many thanks to John Gledhill and Catherine Knight who have represented the village at Patient Forum meetings and to Peter Stutt who has attended a conference on potential government led changes to the Health Service and the expected outcomes.

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District Councillor's Report

At the time of writing, the New Council at Torridge District Council has been elected but we haven't had a meeting yet to decide who does what. Instead, over the past week or so I have talked to members of all parties to informally discuss what we believe should be the priorities over the next four years. As everyone knows, the next few years are going to be tough financially, as Torridge not only has to make £1 million budget savings in 2011/12 but Torridge's revenue budget will need to be reduced by a further £1.6 million over the following three years to 2014/15.

Initial signs, though, are quite promising. There are 14 new councillors on the New Council. They come from a variety of backgrounds, and the ones I have talked to so far, appear well up to speed in understanding the key issues in our area. The main group at Torridge is the Conservatives – who now have 18 seats (out of 36) – and immediately after the election, elected a new leader, Barry Parsons, who will in all probability become leader of the New Council. Barry is well respected by virtually every councillor at Torridge, and hopefully we will all work together to ensure that we hit the beach running with an agreed list of priorities.

So what should be the priorities? I believe that the following are essential –

- Better Support for Businesses After a difficult start North Devon Plus now appears to be about to deliver. Let's keep our fingers crossed!
- Flexible and Supportive Planning Progress over the past few years has been painfully slow, as Torridge has been impacted by an ill-conceived Local Plan and constant changes in staff.
- Help for Young People We start from a very low base, and the rate of unemployment/underemployment of young people in our area is a scandal. We have to be much more pro-active in helping organisations and groups, and,
- Ensuring that we "Work Smarter" to Preserve Existing Services.

As I mentioned at the beginning, Torridge will be impacted by the cutbacks imposed by central government. David Cameroon's ideas about the Big Society have met with a mixed reception throughout the country. Many see it as little more than a smokescreen for cutbacks, and, at the moment, we are also having to deal with the constant initiatives coming from Eric Pickles, Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government. While some of his utterances make sense, they are not followed up, so people are left feeling rather let down. When they are followed up, in the case of the recent Localism Bill, what eventually transpires can best be described as complex, fascinating and creating more

questions than answers. While the Bill talks about devolving decisions down to the grassroots and the importance of neighbourhood plans, the Bill comprises 400 pages with 140 new reserve powers to central government. There is a presumption towards development, which can be shown to be "sustainable", but this could conflict with the claimed bottom-up approach to planning. And how are referendums about local opinions going to be paid for?

However, we must not forget that all governments face re-election; and roughly two to three years before elections we normally begin to see attempts to pump-prime the economy. As I have argued before the present extent of cutbacks is counter-productive and "economic illiteracy". If – and it's a big if – local authorities and other organisations can get themselves slimmer and more "fit for purpose", we in Devon should be able to make better use of whatever pump-priming does become available in a year or so. We can but live in hope!

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
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And finally
